



WHO WE ARE

The Eaglehawk Community House (ECH) is a safe space for all members of the community. We take a comprehensive approach to community involvement, welcoming people of all ages, abilities, religions, and cultures. We are also a disability-friendly facility, providing special access to those with limited mobility.

Many people consider the Eaglehawk Community House their "home away from home," and we take great pride in serving as a hub of connection and support for the community. Through our services and projects, ECH facilitates and supports meaningful community engagement, building social connection and fostering a sense of belonging within the local neighbourhood.

The Eaglehawk Community House offers a variety of daily activities such as food and meal preparation, cooking, packaging, labelling, and storing items for distribution. We also provide "Learn to Cook" classes for beginners and disengaged youth (16-24 years old), hamper assembly, magazine development and distribution, gardening and grounds maintenance, administration, cleaning, and emergency food relief. We also have a meals program, supplying meals to individuals and families

Our ongoing projects focus on promoting diversity & inclusion through events, multicultural cooking days, mental health & wellbeing sessions, the development of our Bi-Monthly Community Mini-Magazine, and Pre-accredited training opportunities for adult learners. These initiatives aim to provide learners with the educational capacity and core skills they need to succeed in study, work, and life. We also hold classes and activities such as Tai Chi, yoga, meditation, basic computer learning, and craft sessions.

CENTRE MANAGER -ANNUAL OVERVIEW

2024 Community Value is equivalent to \$2,464,198

This past financial year has been our most challenging as we worked through balancing the needs and demands of the community verses learning to understand the degree in which our funding organizations were prepared to extend financial assistance to support US as we continued to provide food and personal aid through the current cost of living crisis.

As the only regional organization represented, we featured strongly in the media and advocacy campaign organized through Neighbourhood Houses Victoria seeking increased funding from the Victorian Government to support all Houses across Victoria. This campaign secured an additional 2.5 million dollars through the current State budget.

But once again we have shown how swiftly we can evaluate and pivot when necessary, as Neighbourhood Houses are supposed to do – continuing to identify the unmet needs and provide essential support which is still so vitally important, yet adjust our activities to better match, and work within the financial constraints we continue to experience. This will lead to more volunteer activities available and delivered from the ECH which will allow us to better fund the provisions we need to maintain the level of current support to our community.

Our partnerships are going strong and delivering additional benefits to our community through the ECH. With special thanks to the City of Greater Bendigo, Bendigo TAFE, Tip Top Bakeries, Department of Justice; Bendigo Community Health Services has led to a number of new and additional projects and collaborations this past year, including:

- Attendance at the Be Well Be Connected Expo (COGB)
- Provide valuable feedback and support the Community Volunteering Strategy 2024-2028 (COGB)
- Provided vital feedback for the Bendigo Food Strategy Submission (COGB)
- 5 Ways to Wellbeing sessions 'workshops for Community lunch participants sharing 5 simple steps to improve overall mental health and wellbeing (BCHS)
- Free bread weekly and for special events and monthly volunteering assisting with Community lunch (Tip Top Bakeries)
- Participate in a new initiative 'Take the First Step' in response to the Active Living Censusencouraging healthy eating and active living (COGB/BCHS)
- Continuing to nurture and maintain our existing commitments in Festival of Friendships (mainstream) Dahlia & Arts Festival/Eaglehawk Festivals;
- ECH Community Christmas Party (Toyworld Bendigo & Neighbourhood Houses Greater Bendigo)
- Participated in the Cultural and Linguistically Diverse consultation process (Department of Health)

Along with Bendigo discoveries and MIND organization we also welcomed two new support groups for ADHD and Bipolar. Thankyou for selecting the ECH as your new 'home' – showing again that we provide a safe and non-judgemental space for people with similar experiences to come together, engage, participate and unwind.



I need to share a special thankyou and mention to Abhishek Awasthi and the Indian Association of Bendigo. Abhishek's dedication and commitment to the ECH and through our ongoing partnership we delivered:

- Childrens Diwali with 300 attending.
- Festival of Friendships Multicultural this year welcoming the Persian and Egyptian communities. (Vic State Govt, Indian, Filipino & African Communities)
- Hosted several Victorian Multicultural Community dinners & meetings.
- Attended Holi Festival (IAB) at the Golden Square Pool
- Invited to attend function at Bendigo Art Gallery held for his Excellency the High Commissioner of India.

And of course, the IAB attending the ECH each Christmas and New Year volunteering to deliver our Food Assistance program to people and families doing it tough to ensure our momentum is not lost and our community are not further struggling and likely left with nothing over this important time of year. Additionally, supporting our own ECH volunteers ensuring they can have a much needed and deserved, vital break over this time. The IAB show people they care and are not forgotten, which as humans, is one of the most precious gifts at this vulnerable time.

This partnership, turned close friendship, grew again when I was invited to India for the traditional Indian wedding of Abhishek's brother, Achyutam and his new wife Charu in Mandi, India (to the North). This was truly an amazing adventure and a cultural experience I will never forget. The beauty and simplicity of life, the peace and harmony, the deep devotion and dedication to the Hindu religion, the respect for their elders and each other is truly inspiring. The cultural lessons I have returned to Australia with are ones I have also been able to share in photographs and by telling my/our stories as we were warmly welcomed as part of the family and able to immerse ourselves in another way of life. And it was interesting that the media virtually followed us almost us every day wanting to know our thoughts and opinions of where and how they live and how it compared to our lives in Australia. And the one comparison we heard frequently was that of the height of Mount Everest (8,848.86 m - 29,031ft) compared to that of Mt Kosciuszko (2,228 metres -7,310 ft).

I respectfully want to acknowledge the hard work of our valued bookkeeper Ally Murphy who left us late last year to experience a change in another sector – Ally was a dedicated volunteer, life member, committee member, staff, always willing to do those odd jobs trawling threw the internet specials looking for a better deal for the ECH. You are terribly missed too Ally.

And it is with great sadness that Denise Wilson passed away in December 2024 leaving a huge hole in our AGM today. Denise was always here – almost every year. And even in her last 12 months, often unwell but attending our Community lunches whenever she could. Goodbye Denise and thankyou for all you have done for the ECH and the Houses and citizens of Greater Bendigo.

During the past year we also launched our new website – <u>www.eaglehawkcommunityhouse.com</u>I'm thrilled with our vibrant and happy new image. A very big thankyou to Kelly from KGMG Creative and Rose for helping us to always look our best.

As our regular activities have continued to flow smoothly throughout the year and are all well attended including Community Lunches; Tai Chi; Meditation; Art Classes; Nail Art sessions; Weekly Food Assistance along with crisis support every day when required; volunteering activities; hospitality classes with Barista Training; Cooking on a Budget' workshops to continue the connections from regular participants. We also launched a regular Meals Program with fresh/frozen meals delivered weekly to people who are often housebound or who struggle to cook, possibly for a period of time such as hospital visits or illness. Our gardens are looking terrific too. Our Community Christmas lunch and Volunteer Christmas lunch finished off our 2024 year with much appreciation and satisfaction of a great year.

We provided support to the Eaglehawk Children's Festival with Rochelle's hard work securing \$5,000 of much needed funds through a Vic Health Grant along with providing support at meetings and delivery on the day/evening. A huge thankyou to our team members who also assisted in anyway.

Additionally, we received funding through a COGB grant to upgrade our washing machine and dryer, replacing the old ones after more than 8 years of constant service to the ECH and our community members providing free laundry support.

Behind the scenes, a major project this past year has been working with our landlord YMCA Victoria, builder Steve Turner (Property Improvement Professionals) and our insurance company aiming for an appropriate settlement to undertake major building repairs to the ECH due to the stormwater damage caused mainly to our roof and the ripple impacts of further damage to our walls and floors.

As a registered First Responder with the Australian Red Cross, the ECH, our volunteers and partnerships, particularly with the IAB, are constantly on standby 24/7 ready to provide Emergency Relief and Support to our Emergency Service workers such as VicPol, SES, CFA and likeminded organizations and those impacted by disaster within our region, including but not limited to floods and fires.

A shout out to Lisa Chesters MP and Jacinta Allan MP for supporting our Food Assistance and Volunteer programs. To the COGB providing us with ongoing funding for 3 years along with a grant to assist us with Christmas. Thankyou to Streetsmart, Australia Post, Multicultural Festivals and Events, Vic Health for their funding support. I need to also mention Bendigo Foodshare, Foodbank Victoria and Zonta Bendigo for their ongoing support of the ECH allowing us to assist our community in the ways that we do.

As always thankyou to our Staff, Committee members, valuable volunteers, student and other placements who show up every day to ensure our Community House is the very best that it can be, supporting our community but equally as important is providing support to each other.

FINANCIAL REPORT 2024-2025

The 2024–25 financial year has been a year of strong recovery and steady growth for Eaglehawk Community House. We are pleased to report that the organisation achieved a surplus of \$278.11 a turnaround from the \$23,532 deficit recorded last year. This positive shift reflects both increased community engagement and careful financial management throughout the year.

Total income grew by 15.7% to \$210,477, driven by successful program delivery, community events, and continued support from funding partners. Expenses were well managed, increasing by just 0.4% to \$206,629, despite rising costs across the sector. Our main investment remained in our people, with salaries and wages totalling \$125,604 and superannuation contributions of \$14,259. Other key expenditure areas included program delivery (\$13,416), fundraising activities (\$7,775), and partnership initiatives (\$5,275), all of which directly contribute to the services and opportunities we provide to our community.

From a financial health perspective, the organisation is in a strong position. At 30 June 2025, we held total assets of \$191,834 against liabilities of \$78,785 giving us equity of \$113,048. Our current ratio of 1.56 indicates healthy liquidity, while our debt-to-equity ratio of 0.64 shows that we are maintaining a balanced approach to managing obligations. Importantly, there were no outstanding invoices or unpaid bills at year-end, demonstrating efficient cash flow management.

Our cash reserves remain robust, with \$106,182 held across our accounts. This includes \$56,991 in the operating account for day-to-day needs, \$32,135 in term deposits to secure future stability, and \$16,410 in our GST holding account. These reserves provide a strong buffer for the organisation, ensuring we can continue to operate confidently and respond to emerging community needs.

In summary, FY25 has been a financially successful year for Eaglehawk Community House. Through prudent management, investment in people and programs, and strong community support, we have not only improved our financial position but also strengthened our ability to deliver services. We thank our staff, volunteers, funding partners, and the community for their continued commitment and contribution to our shared mission

Tuesday 19November 2024 **Meeting Commenced:** 11.00am



1. WELCOME

Tracey opened AGM. Everyone was welcomed. Committee and Volunteers were all thanked.

2. PRESENT
